
As co-ops, the civic virtue of voting is in our DNA. We show concern for community—one of the seven cooperative principles—through participation in our democracy.


Our goal is to ensure that rural issues remain part of the national discussion. This is just another way we are looking out for our members and living our purpose of making life better, the cooperative way.

Portable generators can help after storms

Portable generators are very helpful in times of disaster. However, the Consumer Product Safety Commission

(CPSC) reports that more than 70 people die each year due to the improper use of this equipment.



While carbon monoxide poisoning is one of the potential hazards, electrical safety is just as important when operating a portable generator.

Always use generators outdoors and never in an enclosed space such as a garage or crawl space. Place the generator on a level, dry surface under an open-air shelter during wet and rainy weather, being careful to touch the machine with dry hands to prevent electric shock.

Be sure to read the owner's manual for the proper way to operate and use your generator. Improper use can put utility workers at risk.

We hope you will never need to use a portable generator to power your home. But if you do, always operate the equipment safely.

Be safe when decorating with Christmas lights

This holiday season, keep safety first as you decorate your home with colored, shiny and blinking strands of lights.

Because old light cords can become brittle, inspect them for breaks and damage before using them, discarding the faulty strings in the garbage.

When hanging lights with a ladder, don't over reach. It's a good idea to have a second person anchoring the ladder, especially outside when

working with an extension ladder. Many people receive care from hospital emergency rooms each year during the holidays due to falling off ladders while decorating.

To lower the risk of fire, LED lights are a good option for live and artificial trees because they stay cool to the touch.

Lights marked for outdoors may be used indoors, but indoor lights should not be used outdoors.

To save energy, use a timer to turn Christmas lights on in the evening and off before bedtime.


