Solar ownership options

The interest in residential solar is growing. And as your source for power and information, we put together a list to help answer questions you may have. Here are some points to consider when exploring various methods of adding solar to your home.

PURCHASING A SYSTEM

You'll be responsible for making the decisions on what system to purchase, choosing a reputable contractor and more. It's a big investment, so you'll need to spend time researching, asking questions, obtaining multiple bids and reviewing contracts.

To cover the cost of purchasing your solar system, you can pay cash or obtain a loan. The system will be yours, and you'll reap the benefits of all power you generate from the system.

Because you are the owner of the system, you'll have to pay up front for the components and all installation and connectivity costs. You'll most likely be responsible for maintenance and repair costs, and you will bear liability for the system. While some installers offer service and maintenance contracts, not all do.

You may be able to negotiate that in your contract. Be sure to get details in writing before signing any contract.

As the system's owner, you may be able to take advantage of federal, state and local incentives—including a 30%

federal tax credit. This is not a tax refund and will decrease to 26% for systems installed in 2033 and to 22% for systems installed in 2034. (Consult your financial/tax advisor.)

LICENSE PANELS IN OUR COOPERATIVE SOLAR FARM

If you are interested in solar, but face obstacles to installation, licensing panels in our solar farm is a great alternative.

It is easy and affordable. For a onetime payment of \$460 per panel, participating members will receive a 25-year license to one of the panels. That means they will get credit on their monthly power bill for their proportional share of the energy generated by the solar farm, as well as the market value of their panel's capacity. In addition to the bill credits, members have no worries about maintenance or hassles from bolting panels to their roof. And they can monitor panel performance online.

Members can license multiple panels, up to the amount that will cover their home's annual usage.

FLOODING SAFETY

When the water rises, make sure the power's off

If your home has been flooded, it's vitally important to remember that **electricity and water don't mix.**

Blue Grass Energy reminds you that you should not return to the flooded area to begin cleaning up until after the power has been disconnected. And, remember: In most cases, any electric appliances or equipment that were submerged in the water should be replaced.

Do's and don'ts for cleaning up after the flood:

- **DO** keep a flashlight and batteries on hand for maneuvering through flood waters in the dark.
- **DON'T** allow power cord connections to become wet.
- **DO** replace all circuit breakers and fuses that have been submerged in water.
- DON'T touch a circuit breaker or replace a fuse if your hands are wet or
 if you are standing on a wet surface. When resetting breakers, use a dry
 plastic- or rubber-insulated tool. Use only one hand.
